Ocular Inflammatory Disease And Uveitis

Uveitis may be caused by problems or diseases occurring in the eye or it can be part of an inflammatory disease affecting other parts of the body. It can happen at all ages and primarily affects people between 20-60 years old. Uveitis can last for a short (acute) or a long (chronic) time. The severest forms of uveitis reoccur many times. Eye care professionals may describe the disease more specifically as: Anterior uveitis; Intermediate uveitis; Posterior uveitis; Panuveitis uveitis

Early symptoms of uveitis and ocular inflammatory disease may include: A small pupil Changes in the color of the iris, the colored part of the eye around the pupil Decreased or blurred vision Eye pain Floaters (seeing specks or shadows) in the field of vision Photophobia, or sensitivity to light Red ...

Uveitis is a wide range of inflammatory diseases of the eye, specifically the uvea. There are 3 basic layers of the eye - the sclera and cornea on the outside, the retina on the inside, and the uvea in between. The uvea is comprised mostly of blood vessels and connective tissue, including pigmented cells. The different parts of the uvea are the iris in the front, the ciliary body in the middle, and the choroid located behind these, which lies around most of the eye.

Uveitis is associated with several inflammatory diseases including rheumatoid arthritis, sarcoidosis, lupus, and IBD. Uveitis can also be caused by a bacteria or fungi; injury to the eye; or exposure to certain toxic chemicals.

Uveitis has many potential causes, including infections by virus, fungus, bacteria, or parasites. It may be associated with systemic inflammatory diseases (those that affect the whole body), or can develop after an injury to the eye. In a large number of cases, the cause of uveitis is not known.

Uveitis (Eye Inflammation): Causes, Symptoms & Treatment

Uveitis happens when the eye becomes red and swollen (inflamed). Inflammation is the body's response to illness or infection. Most cases of uveitis are linked to a problem with the immune system (the body's defence against infection and illness). Rarely, uveitis may happen without the eye becoming red or swollen.

Many cases of uveitis are linked to a problem with the immune system (the body's defence against illness and infection). For unknown reasons, the immune system can become overactive in the eye. Less often, uveitis can be caused by an infection or an eye injury, and it can also happen after eye surgery. In some cases, a cause cannot be identified.

Uveitis is a form of eye inflammation. It affects the middle layer of tissue in the eye wall (uvea). Uveitis (u-vee-I-tis) warning signs often come on suddenly and get worse quickly.
